Atatürk Museum in Antalya

Traces of the Great Leader





Mustafa Kemal Atatürk, who is one of the greatest leaders in history and the founder of the Republic of Turkey, often went on nationwide trips to listen to the troubles of people and conduct on-site investigations and interviews. The houses he stayed in during these trips have been transformed into museums where Atatürk's memories and personal belongings are exhibited. Atatürk Museum in Antalya is such a house Atatürk stayed in during his visits to Antalya in 1930 and 1935 and continues to honor his memory. Mustafa Kemal Atatürk first visited Antalya on March 6, 1930; he stayed in this house until March 12, during which time he met with farmers and citrus growers and visited historical sites. The Aspendos Theater was repaired and opened to visitors and began to host festivals as a result of Atatürk's orders during this visit.

He stayed in this house again during his visit on February 18, 1935.

The house, which belonged to the Governorate in those years and was later used by schools and public institutions, was demolished in 1984, but was rebuilt in order to honor Atatürk's memory and was opened to visitors in 1986 as Atatürk Museum.

On the first floor of the museum, which is a two-storey building, you can see the news and photos of Atatürk's visit to Antalya and watch a documentary about Atatürk and Antalya.

On the second floor of the museum, there is a room where Atatürk's personal belongings are exhibited and a section where the coins that have been minted since the foundation of the Republic can be seen.

The museum is open every day and can be visited free of charge.
