It is estimated that the building, which is located on the Cekirge Street, was constructed in the late 19th century. The pavilion has two storeys apart from the basement and attic. During Atatürk's second visit to Bursa (20-24 January 1923), Bursa municipality had purchased this building from the Marshall Mehmet Bey and gave it to Atatürk as a gift. After that, Atatürk used to stay in this house during his visits to Bursa, and after 1938 it was sold by the Municipality of Bursa to the Turkish Pension Fund on 06.02.1968, which granted the use of the mansion to the General Directorate of Museums. On 29 October 1973, the 50th Anniversary of the Republic, it was converted to a museum and opened to visitors.

The Pavilion was made under the influence of French architectural art of the 19th century. Balconies, pediment eaves and acroters are considered original examples of woodwork. The house has two storeys apart from the basement and attic. It has a stone structure and the basement floor is reserved as kitchen and service areas.

The First Floor. Situated on the right of the entrance is a reception hall, to the left is the dining hall opening to an entertainment and tea and coffee room.

The Second Floor. On the right there is the bedroom, with the study room on the left, and on the right side of the study room, there is the glasshouse.

The basement floor was used as kitchen and service areas. In the eastern part of the garden, there is a pergola, the interior of which is adorned with hand drawn motifs. Nearly all of the artefacts displayed in the mansion are original items used by Atatürk.
