Three Centuries Old Ottoman House









the ceiling and floor of the ground floor with low ceilings are wooden and do not contain ornaments. On the upstairs there is a hall with a vaulted space recessed therefrom and two rooms, symmetrical to each other, opening to this space reflects the finest example of the art of 17th century wooden ornamentation. The ceiling of the hall is in cream colour decorated with a zigzag pattern with a green and red background and the ceiling of the vaulted space is decorated with a star motif at the centre with hexagons shape motives circling the star. The hall and middle and side open spaces are surrounded with a handdrawn belt, which consists of rumi, palmettes and curled branch motifs.



The house is located on Aralik street, near to the Ottoman Social Complex for Sultan Murat II, in the district of Muradiye in Bursa. The house has three floors, including basement, ground floor, and 1st floor. The basement is accessible from north while the ground and 1st floor are accessible from the courtyard on the west. The house, a civil architecture example, was expropriated and restored in 1946 by the General Directorate of Antiquities and Museums of the Ministry of Education, and opened to visitors in 1958 as a museum with an exhibition arrangement. It was repaired and re-opened for exhibitions again in 1973 and 1992. In terms of exterior of the structure, the eastern facade of the house, which sits on a stone foundation, is plastered up to the first floor level, with slightly outward girders on the 1st floor, complete with bricks bonded in zigzag shape. On the basement level of this facade there are loophole-type windows while the ground floor designed with rectangular form windows and the rectangular windows are topped with round arched gypsum grids on the 1st floor. All windows have timber sashes. Ground and 1. The western facade of the house which provides access to the ground and the 1st floor is divided by wooden posts and the ground floor has a balcony with a wooden balustrade and the 1st floor has windows designed in Bursa arch style to view the outdoor areas. While the northern section is plastered there are no windows on the southern. The building is accessible by a six-step staircase located south of the axis on the western facade.

There is a hall with an open vaulted space recessed from a central hall with one room on each side. This floor plan is repeated in the upstairs. In the interiors of the structure
