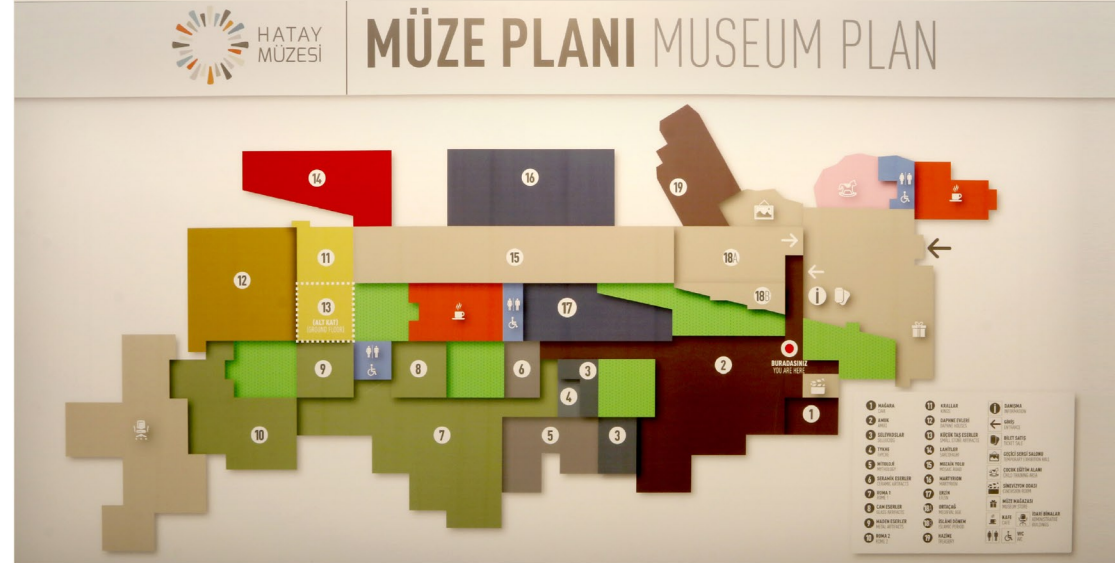

King Shuppililiuma

Huge statue of King Shuppililiuma is found in Tel Tayinat Mound in the Amik Plain. This artefact made of basalt stone and pertaining to late Hittite era is a unique work with its huge size, three dimensional structure, beard, impressiveness of the eye portrait, and many other characteristics it has. There is a scripture in Luvi language at the middle of the statue of the king with a height of 1.5 m and a weight of 1.5 tons. The statue of Shuppililiuma which has become a significant figure from archaeological aspect is ready in Hatay Archaeological museum for the visitors desiring to it.



Antioch Sarcophagus

Antioch Sarcophagus, one of the peerless works in Hatay Archaeological museum pertains to Roman era. The figures on the Sarcophagus lead to consideration that the tomb might belong to a person esteemed highly in his time. Invaluable works found inside Antioch Sarcophagus that is impressive in terms of appearance and workmanship are exhibited in a special room with the skeletons of the persons inside.



Sculpture of Goddess Ishtar

The sculpture of Goddess Ishtar dating back to early Bronze age has quite different characteristics such as its structure made of lapis lazuli stone that is a special stone and its colour.



Angular skulls

The tradition of skull shaped in angular form dating back to mid Chalcolithic era continues still in African continent carried forward from an era of 4000 years ago.



Antioch Tykhe (Goddess of Luck)

Antioch Tykhe (Goddess of Luck) linked with luck, fortune and date of Antiocheia appears as sculpture and relief also on the faces of the coins in terms of being a symbol of the city walls of Antioch, beside Orontes(Asi River), and Mount Habib-I Neccar. This work unique to Antioch is ready to be seen by the visitors of the Hatay Archaeological Museum.
